This class introduces neoliberalism by exploring its histories and philosophies, as well as its cultural, political and economic implications. We also consider how we move beyond neoliberalism to create a more egalitarian and sustainable world. Outside readings will be required.

Shakespeare's strongest women are often said to be those comic heroines who, by cross-dressing as men, gain male privilege and access to the world of men. Portia, Rosalind, and Viola are as intelligent and resourceful as any male characters Shakespeare ever drew, yet ultimately they shed their disguises for marriage, and in so doing resume traditional positions of submission. Shakespeare created other women, however, who achieve strength and power without forfeiting their gender identities. In this course, we shall discuss how the women in three very different plays – a comedy, *Much Ado About Nothing*, a so-called problem play, *Measure for Measure*, and a tragedy, *Antony and Cleopatra*—struggle valiantly to maintain their identities and integrity in the face of patriarchal oppression.

The course will include at least one film version of each play.

First Semester: "Ingmar Bergman and the Cinema of Ideas": the art cinema movement that began after World War II changed the audience for movies in American cities by offering new perspectives created by true "authors" like Fellini, Antonioni, Ozu Krosawa, Truffaut, and Godard. Perhaps the greatest of these filmmakers was Ingmar Bergman from Sweden, whose body of work now seems as substantial and creative as that of any artist in the twentieth century. The course will consist of seven representative films covering more than two decades of his prolific career: *The Seventh Seal, Wild Strawberries, The Magician, Winter Light, Persona, The Passion of Anna, and Fanny and Alexander.* 

Second Semester: With Bergman's influence in mind, the course will examine five contemporary films that extend the traditions of the art cinema.
